FURTHER REFLECTION

Last Sunday, Pastor Vicki's sermon focused on the Parable of the Yeast found in Matthew's gospel (13:33-35). Jesus often started his stories with the words: "The kingdom of God is like..." In this story, he likens the kingdom to a woman who hides yeast in 3 measures (40-60 pounds) of flour. Earlier this week, Jim McKenna shared thoughts, included here with his permission. Jim wrote:

Your sermon got me thinking...so, here is another interpretation:

Sunday

The yeast is God's spirit in each of us and like yeast, that spirit transforms us. It transforms us from just very intelligent animals to human beings capable of perceiving God and understanding love and applying that (love) to other people and other creatures. Also, like yeast, the transformation depends on the conditions for development. Given a warm, quiet environment, yeast in dough will reach its fullest development. Nurture the spirit in people and we can reach our greatest potential, but in a cold, unimaginative situation, one does not rise much above the animal instincts. One difference from the yeast in bread is that God has given humans free will and choices.

Thanks for sharing your thoughts, Jim. It's great to chew on Jesus' story and to consider the variety of ways we understand his teaching.

A CHANCE TO LEARN AND GROW IN FAITH

During these last two months, many of our leaders have been grappling with the reality of homelessness. In mid-August, the issue came to the forefront when two people who did not have housing, began sleeping on and near our green. When our kids study Abraham and Sarah this Sunday, they may hear about strangers who appear in our lives. Whether sent by God or not, such individuals can help us deepen our understanding and our practice of being people of faith in a world where homelessness exists. At their September meetings, the Deacons and the Trustees talked about this recent encounter with people who are homeless. The conversations were helpful. It is evident to me - we have varied knowledge and experiences related to the issue. Some people are well versed, and others are learning quickly about the systems that create poverty and homelessness and the hard reality: finding solutions is difficult, not to mention expensive.

Last night, the Church Council had the chance to hear from County Legislator Cathy Bischoff. She spoke for over 30 minutes (without a single note) as she described the important work that has begun to address homelessness in this region. We concluded that we want to keep learning and keep listening to how God is nudging us forward. As God's faithful people, how <u>do</u> we offer welcome to all?

We are going to read and discuss two books (each is available for Kindle):

A Place Called Home by David Ambroz

Rough Sleepers by Tracy Kidder
